

For many people, an 'adventure' is something quite simple, like a holiday experiencing a different culture. For others, 'adventure' has a different meaning. For three young men in 2009, it meant a race of 430 miles to the South Pole. They were competing with a team from Norway. The Norwegians were professional skiers and familiar with the conditions, whereas the British team were amateurs and had never skied in Antarctica before. For them it was a real adventure. It was not the first crazy journey for Ben Fogle, a TV presenter, and James Cracknell, an Olympic champion. A few years before, they had rowed across the Atlantic in a race. During that journey, the pair had had to deal with problems. For instance, they dealt with heat exhaustion, lack of sleep, hurricane-type weather, and nearly drowning. Amazingly, they got together again for another challenge – the South Pole. This time they were joined by another amateur, Doctor Ed Coats. This adventure was even more dangerous because Ben had just recovered from a serious medical condition. Ben and the other two spent months training. This journey proved to be even more difficult. They had to cover over 25 miles a day in freezing conditions. They only allowed themselves four hours sleep a night and they spent hours melting ice so they had water to drink. They finished the race with no food left, and their hands and feet were suffering from the icy temperatures. All three had lost weight and were in pain. Even worse, they didn't beat the Norwegians!

### MARIA MONTESSORI

Maria Montessori was a truly exceptional woman who revolutionised the way we think about education. Against the wishes of her father but supported by her mother, at the age of thirteen, she went to an all-boys technical institute in Rome where she excelled at maths and biology but then decided to study medicine, becoming the first female medical graduate in Italy in 1896.

Her studies in psychiatry and pedagogy led to a passionate interest in children's education and when she was working with a group from the poorest parts of Rome she observed very carefully how they were learning and experimented with new teaching methods. Maria believed that children have a natural desire to learn, that they should follow their natural interests and that they should be in a classroom which encourages them to discover new things. In the following years Maria dedicated her time to writing books and articles about her teaching method and gave lectures to teachers and educationalists. Montessori schools started to open in Europe and the United States and today many teachers accept Maria's theory that the child should be the centre of attention in the classroom and that the teacher should observe and follow the child's progress. Maria was also an energetic promoter of women's rights and she often said that society had to give greater opportunities to women. She probably remembered how hard it was for her as a girl and young woman when she was often the only girl in class. In her later life Maria spent six years in India during the Second World War and then returned to Europe where she died in 1952 at the age of 81. Today, thanks to this remarkable woman, millions of children all over the world have received and are receiving an education in Montessori schools and her example has inspired millions of women to fight against discrimination and follow their dreams.



### **DUNCAN WATERS - BIRDWATCHER**

When I was a child I loved to watch all the different varieties of birds that came into our back garden. Some of them made nests and stayed for months but most just landed for a few minutes and flew away. Then, as a teenager, I joined my local birdwatching club and now I spend every weekend out in the country trying to find new species. I have been a birdwatcher for more than forty years and my wife thinks I'm mad but my daughter came out with me last weekend. I think she'll be a great birdwatcher.

What do you need to be a birdwatcher? Well, basically, your eyes and your ears. You can identify birds from their colour and size but expert birdwatchers can identify them by listening to their song. You also need a pen and paper to write down the names of the species you see or hear. I now have more than five thousand birds on my list. The next stage is to buy a pair of binoculars. With them you can see birds at a longer distance and in greater detail. Many birdwatchers like me are in a club and every Saturday or Sunday we spend the day in different parts of the countryside. Last year we bought a telescope and next year we're going to build a look-out in our local bird sanctuary which we can use in all weathers.

Why do I watch birds? Like the millions of birdwatchers around the world I love being out in the open air and there is nothing more thrilling than seeing a species you have never seen before. It also gives me the opportunity to travel because our club has links with many clubs in other countries. Next summer we're going for three weeks to Denmark and Sweden. My wife is now sure I'm mad!
